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### Introduction

Who were Christ's Apostles? Maybe you can rattle off a list of names or even a few facts about these people, Jesus' prominent followers. You may have heard about their expansive missionary work, miraculous healings, or explosive sermons. But as you study their service to Christ, it's easy to forget that these men weren't always saints.

God didn't use these people to do great things because they were the best He could find. In fact, if you examine their lives closely, you might question why God would pick these men at all. Christ chose a thief, a terrorist, a murderer, social outcasts, uneducated fishermen, and utter nobodies—people that many of us would overlook and avoid.

But God had a plan for His Apostles, just as He does for each believer today. He taught them, encouraged their simple faith, and led them to spread the gospel. As you study the great accomplishments of the early church, you won't simply admire the work of the Apostles themselves, but rather the power of their God.

The purpose of this study is not only to give students a greater knowledge of the Apostles' lives, but also to give them a view of Christ's transforming, enabling power in action.

We pray this study will be a blessing and a challenge to you and your students as you watch God's grace at work.

This section includes seven Scripture readings for each week of the study. Each reading assignment contains the passage, several questions about the reading, and a section for you to record your own thoughts and questions.

#### HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THIS STUDY

#### Class Time

- Prepare before you get to class—bring your student book and a pen or pencil.
- Review. A quick flip-through of the previous lesson will refresh your memory.
- Take notes. You aren't limited to just filling in blanks. Write down your own thoughts and questions during the teacher's lesson.
- Participate in discussions. It's OK to talk.

#### **Student Work**

- Pick the best time of your day to study the passages and pray. Try to find a time and place free of distraction. Play some quiet music or go to the library—whatever helps you focus.
- Begin with prayer, using what you've learned in this study so far. Ask
  God to teach you through the Scripture readings.
- Consider keeping a notebook to record prayers, take notes, ask questions, and record your Bible study thoughts.
- After you've studied and meditated on the passage, discuss what you've learned with friends or other students studying this material.
- Consider memorizing portions of the readings.

Not everyone will have the time or resources to be a Super-Bible-Scholar and study these passages for ten hours every day. Use what time you can to dig into these verses, and consider revisiting them later if you're limited on time.

#### YOU ARE QUALIFIED TO STUDY THE BIBLE

If you're a Christian, you have the ability to study God's Word as much as any theological professor or pastor. These people don't possess a special gift for learning that's only available to full-time ministry workers. Any Christian can—and should—study the Bible and share what they learn.

#### The Holy Spirit Lives in You

The Holy Spirit lives in you, and He gives you understanding of spiritual truths and helps you remember them (John 14:26; 1 Cor. 2:10–13).

#### The Bible Is a Living Book

Unlike any human-written book, the Bible has a divine Author who actively communicates with His readers. That's why it's possible to read the same passage several times and each time understand new things about it that you didn't previously notice.

#### God Gives Wisdom

Ask God for wisdom, and He will give it (James 1:5–6). Our human knowledge won't understand the spiritual nature of God's words. We can only learn truth with His help.

With God's help, you can do it! May He bless you as you continue to grow in your relationship with Him.
